HISTORY OF **MFANTSIPIM SCHOOL**

At its Synod in 1870, the Methodist Church in Ghana decided to establish an all-boys secondary school, dedicated to fostering intellectual and spiritual growth. Accordingly, on Monday 3rd April 1876, the Wesleyan High School started operating in Cape Coast as the first-second cycle in the then Gold Coast.

The school started with 17 students and James Picot, who was 18 years old as the first Headmaster. The school changed names several times before John Mensah-Sarbah, one of the pioneer students who had become an accomplished lawyer came up with the name 'Mfantsipim'. It started as the Wesleyan High School, became High School and Training Instruction, Wesleyan Collegiate School, Richmond College and finally Mfantsipim.

For Sarbah and his friends, the name "Mfantsipim" was not to be broken into syllables to indicate "Mfantsefo Apem" (A thousand Fantes). They were more focused on the future needs of the country as a whole and to them "Mfantsipim" meant the 'Soul of the People' and it was in the School that the "souls of the people of Ghana" would mature. Mensah Sarbah also gave the school its motto "Dwen Hwe Kan".

In 1891 the Wesleyan High School assumed the name of the Wesleyan Collegiate School at a time when it was saddled with challenges such as shortage of funds, unsuitable accommodation, and inadequacy of

qualified staff. Under these dire circumstances, John Mensah Sarbah and a few others decided to tackle the problems and formed the Fante Public Schools Limited. The company set up in April 1905, a high school called 'Mfantsipim' which was distinct from the Wesleyan Collegiate School. Unfortunately, both schools still experienced serious difficulties and to save the situation, they were merged in July 1905 under the management of the Methodist Church, with the name "Mfantsipim".

Over the years, several Headmasters have served the School with distinction. Their vision, commitment, and hard work are what has made the school what it is today. Rev. W.T. Balmer of the Methodist Church, Principal of Richmond College in Sierra Leone arrived in Cape Coast in 1907 on an inspection and met only eight (8) dedicated boys in the school teaching themselves because there was neither a teacher nor a Headmaster. He named them the "Faithful Eight" and accepted to stay and take charge of the school as Headmaster. During the centenary celebrations of Mfantsipim in 1976, a monument was erected in their memory. Rev. R. A. Lockhart (1925-1936) consolidated the achievements of Rev. Balmer, Rev. Dyer, and Rev. Sneath.

Mr. F. L. Bartels, the first African Headmaster (1949 – 1961) took over when there was an improved official policy in the matter of secondary education in the country. He applied himself diligence to the urgent question of expansion and development. Subsequent Headmasters of Mfantsipim have all played their role in making Mfantsipim what it is today.

In his book **'Mfantsipim and the Making of Ghana'** Professor Albert Adu Boahen ('64) recounts the story of an "Old Boy" who wrote a letter to the editor of the ***Gold Coast Echo*** dated 10th September 1888.

The "Old Boy" drew attention to the discouraging state of the school and attributed it to the internal administration not being *'so active as it used to be in the days of Mr. Picot and Mr. Mountford.'* He indicated that *'The days of the Wesleyan High School, Cape Coast, are numbered unless the Principal of the school, whoever he be, bestir himself and follow in the wake of the past successful masters of the School.'*

The love for Mfantsipim and the passionate desire to see it develop positively by "Old Boys" started so many years ago. To achieve this objective, numerous efforts were made in the 1940's and 1950's by "Old Boys" to organize themselves into a formidable group to 'give back' to the School. This resulted in the Mfantsipim Old Boys Association(MOBA) being officially inaugurated in 1947. The compilation of a register of 'Old Boys' was started and an Old Boys' Reunion was held from 29 – 31 July 1949. In 1950, the Constitution and bye-laws of the Association were revised, and several meetings were held by the Central Committee to revive Year Groups and branches of the association and plan the 75th Anniversary Speech Day.

In 1951, a special fund to assist in equipping and maintaining the Africa section of the school Library raised an amount of £270. Then again Old Boys raised 200 guineas to enable the School send four (4) Ghanaian teachers to the UK for refresher courses.

After a few years, the title of 'President' was changed to 'Ebusuapanyin' and the first official Ebusuapanyin of MOBA was the late Dr. J. V. L. Philips who was succeeded by Mr. E. D. Kom. Each administration worked hard to keep the association together by providing leadership and a focal point for support for the school.

In 1997 a new National Executive Committee, with Dr. Francis Poku as Ebusuapanyin, was voted into office at a Congress held in the School Assembly Hall in Cape Coast. Dr. Poku and his team made substantial and long-lasting contributions to the development of MOBA and Mfantsipim. They focused on improving structures that had been put in place in furtherance of the aims of MOBA.

A new constitution was drafted and adopted to guide the activities of the association and serve as a master document for Year Groups to follow in fashioning their own constitutions and bring legality to MOBA.

The key feature of the new constitution was the creation of the MOBA National Council made up of two (2) representatives from every Year Group and Chapter as the highest decision-making body of MOBA.

The perceived disconnect between the National Executive Committee and the Year Groups was bridged and they now had the opportunity to be directly involved in taking decisions for the benefit of both MOBA and the school.

Other initiatives of the Dr. Poku led NEC included but were not limited to the following:



First MOBA Secretariat , now GT Bank-Ringroad

- The establishment of a permanent Secretariat. It was first located on the Ring Road and then moved to its present location at the Methodist Church Conference Office.
- Continued with the MOBA Annual Christmas cocktails instituted by their predecessors.
- Supported the introduction of the Mfantsipim and Adisadel Funday Games.
- Set up the Renaissance Committee to develop a master plan for the Infra-structural development of the school and put in place a funding scheme. Chaired by Frank Tackie ('67), a document was produced and endorsed by the School Board.
- Revived the construction of library complex at the School during the 125th Anniversary. The library complex (now Kofi Annan Building) stands as an imposing edifice at Mfantsipim after it was eventually completed with assistance from the GETFund.
- Refurbishment of Senior Science Lab. Through the efforts of Old Boys in Tullow Ghana, US\$500,000 was

given by Tullow Ghana and its Jubilee Partners towards the project.

- Instituted Founders' Day celebration. A bus was provided for Old Boys to travel from Accra to Cape Coast to celebrate the event with the school.
- Conduct of elections to elect a new Ebusuapanyin and new executive members of National Executive Committee.

Other members of Dr. Poku's team were the late Albert Kittoe ('64): Vice-President, Ernest Kwesie ('64): Treasurer, Reginald Hansen-Thompson ('72) Assistant Treasurer, William Sam ('66): Secretary, K. B. Coleman ('76): Assistant Secretary and Eugene Kwakyi ('77): Organizer

In July 2015, a new MOBA National Executive Committee with Capt. Paul Forjoe ('73) as Ebusuapanyin was inducted into office at a solemn service at the Calvary Methodist Church, Adabraka. The oath of office was administered by the then Presiding Bishop of the Methodist Church Ghana the Most Rev. Prof. Emmanuel Asante.

Capt. Forjoe and his team with the support of the MOBA National Council for the past seven years, have worked tirelessly to build on the structures and policies initiated by their predecessors but most importantly have in so many ways strived to unite the MOBA family.

Headmaster Rev. R. A. Lockhart (1925 - 1936) is quoted as saying: "Who hurts the honour of this School hurts my honour, it is the only thing I have in this country...to be Principal of Mfantsipim is a great privilege". Our actions as "Old Boys" reecho these words: "What hurts the honour of Mfantsipim hurts us greatly because this is the School that has made us what we are today - It is indeed a great privilege to be an 'Old Boy' of Mfantsipim."

Presiding Bishop:

In his book "Mfantsipim and The Making of Ghana", Professor A. Adu Boahen describes the formation on Mfantsipim as follows:

"On April 3rd, 1876, Wesleyan High School opened its doors in Cape Coast with seventeen (17) students. By year's end, the count had risen to twenty-eight, including four in-training teachers, two of whom were to serve as assistants in the school and the other two as masters in the elementary school.

The school was established as a teacher training center in addition to a secondary school. "We have not the slightest doubt that the school will ultimately be a success," was stated with confidence at the end of the year in a report on the Cape Coast Circuit's schools.

Such were the auspicious beginnings of the School, which; under various names (Wesleyan High School, High School and Training Institution, Collegiate School, Richmond College and Mfantsipim), at various sites (the Mission House, in the former Colonial School on Saltpond road, Acquah's House, Coussey's House at the foot of MaCarthy Hill, Government buildings near Isolation Hospital, Sea View House, Mount Hope and Kwabotwe), and at great cost and sacrifice especially on the part of the Wesleyan Mission, Ghanaians in general and the National School of Cape Coast in particular was to grow into the famous Mfantsipim School today.

Thousands of boys and a few girls, from the time of its formation with seventeen students, through the period of the fabled 'Faithful Eight' to the present day, have passed through the hallowed gates of Mfantsipim, the oldest secondary school in Ghana.

The Mfantsipim tradition does not die when the person leaves the school. People do not pass through Mfantsipim; Mfantsipim passes through them. The tradition lives on in the person and the person becomes an integral part of the school having graduated to that distinguished club known as 'Old Boys'.

1947 marked an important milestone in the history of Mfantsipim with the inauguration of the Mfantsipim Old Boys Association (MOBA). Since then, MOBA has formed an important and integral part of the Mfantsipim tradition with its creed 'DWEN HWE KAN'; a tradition which goes on and grows from strength to strength.

As we prepare to swear in the newly elected members of the National Executives Committee of the Mfantsipim Old Boys Association (MOBA) headed by the Ebusuapanyin. Let me take this opportunity to congratulate the outgoing Ebusuapanyin his team.

We are gathered here in the presence of God and in the name of the Church, to induct into office members of the MOBA National Executive Committee, who have been elected and to let them know the responsibilities that go with the office.

As the newly elected members of the MOBA National Executives Committee, you have been called to take up the responsibility of overseeing the work of MOBA.

We believe that you have given thought to the responsibilities which have been imposed on you by this appointment, and that you will weigh them, apply yourself to them and ask for help from God, who alone can enable you fulfill your duties well.

Now, in order that everyone here to witness this service may fully understand your intentions, and in order that your recollection of this moment may bestir you to your responsibilities, I now invite the newly elected members of the MOBA National Executives Committee of the Mfantsipim Old Boys Association to come forward and answer these questions:

[Incoming National Executives Committee members proceed to the front]

Presiding Bishop: Do you, in the name of God and in the presence of His Church accept this trust and responsibility?

Answer: I do.

Presiding Bishop: Are you determined to carry out your responsibilities faithfully?

Answer: I am so determined by the grace of God.

Presiding Bishop: Are you prepared to ensure that academic work, moral education, and religious training in Mfantsipim will be raised higher than their present standard, so that the teachers, students, and pupils who come out of our school will be seen to be committed Christians and good citizens of our country, Ghana?

Answer: I am so prepared, the Lord being my Helper.

[Oath of Office to be administered].

Oath of Office:

I a member of good standing of the Mfantsipim Old Boys Association (MOBA) do (in the name of the Almighty God swear) that having been elected to the high office of of the Mfantsipim Old Boys Association (MOBA), will bear true faith and allegiance to the traditions and beliefs of Mfantsipim School as established by the founding fathers and generations afterwards, that I will uphold, preserve, protect and defend the good name and traditions of Mfantsipim, and that I will at all times think and look ahead. (So help me God).

Declaration By Presiding Bishop of The Methodist Church, Ghana

On this day, Sunday, the 28th day of April 2024, I, the Most Rev. Dr. Paul Kwabena Boafo, Presiding Bishop of the Methodist Church, Ghana, and Chairman of the Board of Mfantsipim School, hereby declare the newly elected members of the National Executives Committee of the Mfantsipim Old Boys Association (MOBA) duly inducted.

- **Presiding Bishop assisted by Administrative Bishop will then place the Chain of Office around the neck of the new MOBA NEC members**
- **Prayer by Presiding Bishop & other members of the Clergy present for MOBA NEC**
- **The Book of Office will then be signed by the new MOBA NEC members in front of everyone. (Choir sings MHB 353 - Just as I am without one plea)**
- **After last MOBA NEC member signs, the outgoing Ebusuapanyin Capt. Paul Forjoe after saying a few words will then hand over the symbol of office to the new Ebusuapanyin Moses Baiden Jnr.**

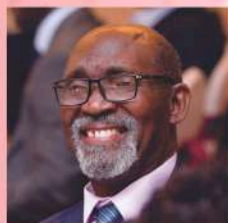
The 'Dawn of a New Era'

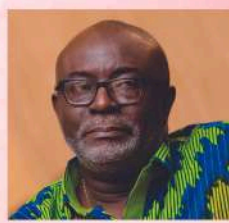

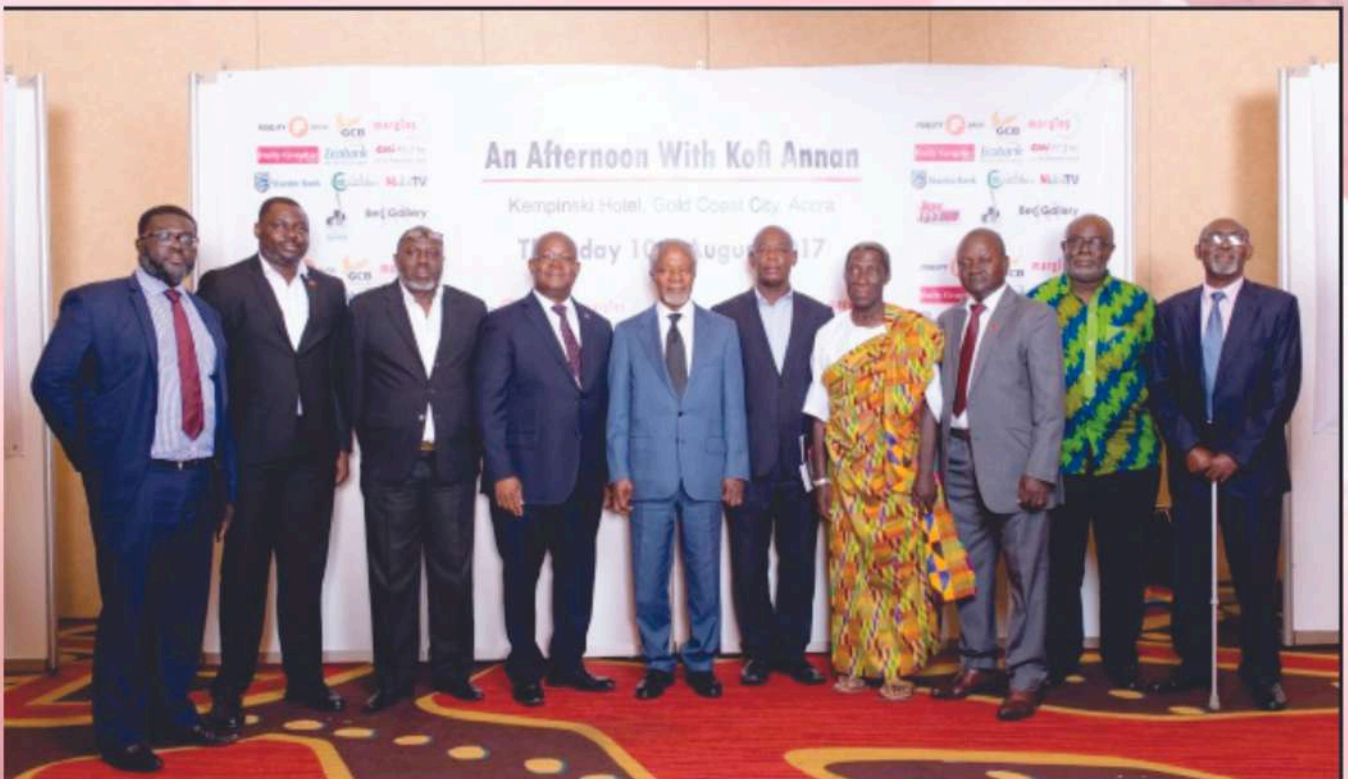

Speech by Ebusuapanyin Capt. Paul Forjoe at the Valedictory Service for Outgoing MOBA NEC Members

Most Reverend Dr Paul Kwabena Boafo, Presiding Bishop of the MCG, RT. Rev. Michael Agyakwa Bossman, Administrative Bishop of the MCG., Distinguished ladies and Gentlemen; Senior Old Boys, Fellow old boys, Friends of Mfantsipim and members of the media.

In 2015, MOBA was in a state of deep division fuelled mainly by the personal ambitions of several old boys and unfortunately had a National Executive that had been in office for 18 years and were tired.

Fortunately, a new constitution had just been adopted for MOBA based on a federal system of governance at the national level with a National Council as its highest plenary.

The National Council was made up of two (2) representatives from each Year Group. It also called for elections to be held based for the first time on each Year Group having one vote.

At the end of May that year, I was pleasantly surprised to be visited by a group of passionate Old boys who requested that I consider standing for the position of Ebusuapanyin to stop the divisions and bring stability to the fraternity. I must admit that as they opened my eyes to the depth of the divisions, I realised that I had been cornered and could not refuse to offer my services to MOBA and by extension my beloved Alma Mata, Mfantsipim. They offered to do all the legwork to ensure my success at the elections. On 2nd July 201, I won the elections by a landslide and the rest as they say is history.

Today we are here to give thanks to God almighty for that history which is coming to an end with this Valedictory Service – the first of its kind in the 77 years of MOBA’s existence.

Together and in several ways, this NEC team has managed the affairs of MOBA for the past 9 years. When we took over, MOBA had no funds and a non-functional Secretariat.

Please indulge me as I list a few of the achievements of MOBA during the tenure of office of this outgoing NEC in no particular order:

8. Annual Mfantsipim staff appreciation ceremony
9. Regularization of Year Group Inaugurations.
10. Institutionalization of Annual Dues for year groups.
11. Establishment of a permanent MOBA Projects Committee.
12. Covid-19 contributions to Ghana’s national efforts.

- Water & Sanitation improvement in the school.
- Introduction for the first time of MOBA Cloth(s).
- Regularization of the Associations documents at the Registrar General's Department.
- Onboarding orientation for incoming headmaster(s).
- Instituting the MOBA recognition of outgoing Presiding Bishops of the Methodist Church and the marked improvement in the general working relationship between the MCG and MOBA.
- The refurbishment and supply of new Science equipment for both Science Laboratory buildings in Mfantsipim at a cost in excess of a million US dollars.
- Significant Land acquisition in Cape Coast for MOBA.
- Food fund for the school when needed.
- Refurbishment of the Schools Dining Hall kitchen together with the supply of deep freezers and other urgently required utensils.
- Overseeing two (2) successive MOBA NEC elections.
- Refurbishment of the MOBA Secretariat.
- Significantly increased interest among old boys with respect to MOBA activities as evidenced by the recent MOBA NEC elections.
- Construction of a Duplex and a quadruplex for staff accommodation.
- Construction of a new Infirmary building.
- Provision of a full set of new instruments for the School's regimental band.
- Provision and maintenance of a Brand New 30-seater School bus
- Introduction of E-Learning in Mfantsipim.
- The construction of the GH¢30M + Kwabotwe Centre of sports excellence which when completed will define the spirit of MOBA and Mfantsipim for its audacious pragmatism and magnificence.

There are many more we could list:

- Fully fund annually the School's annual Speech and Prize giving ceremony and activities.
- Annually Fund the Kwabotwe Dwen Kan Forum
- Fully fund annually the costs of the Mfantsipim NSMQ team.
- Partnering with the Methodist Church, Ghana to pay off the School's Judgement debt.

Formed in 1947, MOBA is a voluntary Association which seeks to bring together old students of Mfantsipim to provide a healthy network for its members to achieve their individual aspirations as well as to provide the platforms for the mobilisation of resources to supplement whatever resources the central government provides for the management of Mfantsipim.

We believed that by creating a unique brand, many more old students would be encouraged to become members so that we could collectively maintain our vision of being the best second cycle alumni association, encourage other alumni associations to emulate us and thereby improve secondary education in Ghana.

We have had two major constitutional reviews and leave office with a new constitution that we believe will lead to the transformational change of MOBA to an efficient, self-dependent and progressive alumnae association capable of steering the future of our Alma Mata as the best 2nd cycle alumni association.

In October 2023, MOBA held elections for its national executives. It was well organised and generated a lot of interest within and outside the MOBA community. It demonstrated the interest and commitment of Old Boys to the progress of MOBA.

Of the eligible 60-year Groups 59 cast their votes and each of our newly elected executives had the unanimous support of the year groups. They take office at the end of April 2024 with the strong goodwill and support of the fraternity.

The incoming Ebusuapanyin campaigned on a vision that embraced amongst others the following:

- A significant upgrade of the MOBA Secretariat's working systems, staff and operations.
- Introduction of enhanced ultra-modern digital tools to improve MOBA's networking and growth.
- Introduction of enhanced ultra-modern digital tools to improve the operations of Mfantsipim.
- Working towards taking back the school from Government.

The results of the elections give the incoming NEC a clear and positive mandate to proceed accordingly as such.

Since 2018, our NEC has had meetings and deliberations with subject experts and engaged other like minded alumni associations on how best to take back our schools from the current GES system.

This outgoing NEC is very pleased that going forward, MOBA will continue to work towards the provision of the requisite enabling framework and collaborate with the Methodist Church Ghana to take back the School.

There are proposals for the following:

- 150th Anniversary Cloth.
- 150th Anniversary Song.
- 150th Anniversary Book – sequel to Adu Boahene's 100th Anniversary book.
- 150th Anniversary Documentary.

It is proposed that the 150th Speech Day will be on the School field. That MOBA will continue to complete the sports Complex completely before starting any other project with the only exception being the Infirmary project which is our only other outstanding project.

In 2015 we dubbed our tenure of stewardship to the MOBA fraternity as the Dawn of the new era. It was an era of highlighting our traditions, stabilizing our fraternity and establishing the foundations to define the trajectory of MOBAs future. Over that era, I believe we have achieved most if not all what we set out to do.

As we enter the twilight of that era, it is appropriate to give thanks and to show gratitude to all who have made it possible for us to serve MOBA and Mfantsipim.

To God almighty we say, Father thank you for having brought us this far. We acknowledge that all we have done has only been made possible by your grace and divine guidance.

To the Presiding Bishop and the Methodist Church Ghana we extend to you our heartfelt gratitude for all you have done and continue to do for MOBA and Mfantsipim.
